

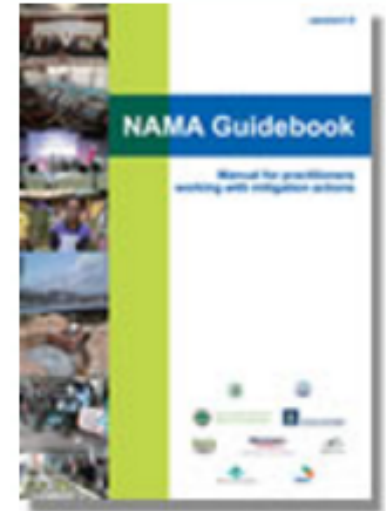

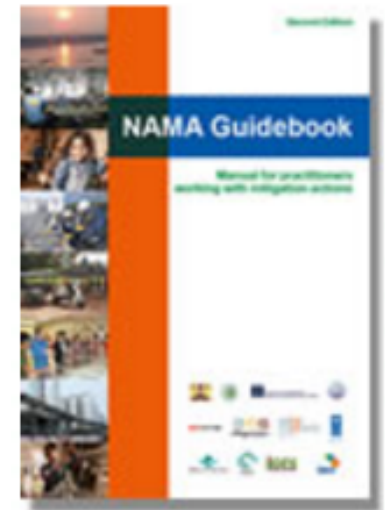
Introduction of the NAMA Guidebook

- The NAMA Guidebook is an easy-to-read reference documents for all stakeholders involved in mitigation actions such as nationally appropriate mitigation actions (NAMAs).
- The Guidebook features essential information to plan, design and implement of mitigation actions, as well as a summary of good practices at the local, national, and international level.
- It is an initiative from the Ministry of the Environment of Japan (MOEJ), and is a sister publication of the MRV Guidebook in charge of IGES.



Characteristics of the NAMA Guidebook

- Kind of a “living document” as anyone who wants to contribute with articles can do so;
- Basically the structure is divided in two:
Theoretical concepts and case studies, aiming at providing lessons learned;
- New editions do not replace previous ones as each of the articles and case studies are new and different.



Objective of the NAMA Guidebook

1) To build upon on-the-ground mitigation/MRV projects and experiences

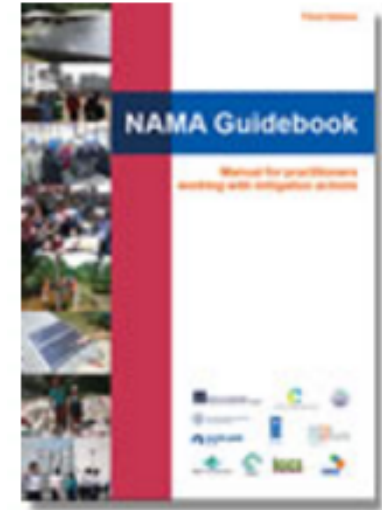
To build upon experience ranging from the formulation and implementation of NAMAs, at the national and international level,

2) To become a real reference tool

This Guidebook series aims to become reference sources for all the stakeholders.

3) To contribute to net global emission reductions

To assist stakeholders in developing and implementing NAMAs/MRV projects which could contribute to the achievement of sustainable low-carbon development and simultaneously net global GHG emissions reduction.



Some outcomes...

1. Key reference for training

NAMA Guidebook used in several capacity building activities with a special focus on focal points of ministries and local governments of developing countries. (E.g. JICA climate change strategies course, UNDP, FAO. Vietnam, Cambodia);

2. Co-written by international research organizations

High participation and involvement of international research organizations and ministries of developing countries. (E.g. UNDP, FAO, WRI, ECN, South Pole Group, NewClimate Institute, IGES, NIES);

3. Announced through key sources

Announced as a key reference material in international networks. (NAMA Partnership, NAMA Wiki, FAO network)
